



Grant Opportunities from NDPRD

LWCF Grant Applications Due Dec. 4

The ND Parks and Recreation Department (NDPRD) received approximately \$845,281 of federal grant monies that will be available for outdoor recreation projects through the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). Applicants may request a minimum grant amount of \$15,000.

The LWCF is a 50/50 matching grant program administered at the state level by NDPRD and funded at the federal level by the U.S. Department of Interior, National Park Service. LWCF provides grants for outdoor recreation projects such as ball fields, pools, campgrounds, playgrounds and land acquisitions for park development. Projects will be required to start in the fall of 2018.

Applications are online at www.parkrec.nd.gov under the Grants tab. The deadline is Dec. 4 at 1 p.m. CT.

RTP Grant Applications Due Jan. 31

NDPRD is seeking Recreational Trails Program (RTP) grant applications for 2019. NDPRD will have approximately \$930,000 available for motorized and non-motorized recreational trail projects.

RTP is an 80/20 matching grant program administered at the state level through NDPRD with guidance from the Recreational Trails Program Advisory Council and federally through the Federal Highway Administration.

Applicants may request grant amounts ranging from a minimum of \$10,000 to a maximum of \$200,000 and must have at least 20 percent match available at the time of the application. Eligible projects consist of construction of new recreation trails, restoration of existing trails, development and rehabilitation of trailside and trailhead facilities and trail linkages, purchase and lease of recreational trail construction and maintenance equipment, land acquisition/easements and trail accessibility assessment. Projects will be required to commence in 2019.

Applications will be online at www.parkrec.nd.gov under the Grants tab starting Dec. 1 with a deadline of Jan. 31 at 1 p.m. CT.



COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

Shane Norsdven was elected to the Killdeer Park Board in his early 20s. After being raised in Killdeer, he says he wanted to get involved in the community. "I was wanting to bring a younger perspective to the park board," he notes.

He has been on the board for nearly eight years and, for the past year, has served as board president, with the goal to provide the community with a "fun, safe place for kids to play."

"We want to get kids involved again and get our kids out into the community," he continues.

One of the ways the park board is focusing on this goal is through developing additional recreational

activities. "We're working on providing more activities, and we got our baseball program up and running again. We want to provide more equipment and more places for kids to play," says Norsdven.

He says one of the challenges of being a park board member is developing new ideas and seeing them through to implementation. "It is all about getting the community

support, feedback and participation to develop new ideas," Norsdven notes. "The hardest part is it can't all happen at once."

With the return of the community's baseball program, the park board and the city of Killdeer constructed a large baseball park. In addition, the park board has also been working to add additional playground equipment in the community.

NDRPA is a valuable resource for park boards, says Norsdven, providing the opportunity to network with other communities. "There are so many other cities that have been through what we have, and we can reach out to them."

Norsdven's favorite parks and

recreation activities include baseball and softball. "Growing up, I was also always playing at the basketball courts."

He says the Killdeer Park Board is working hard to continue to enhance its great community. "It's a work in progress," Norsdven says. "Killdeer is a great place to raise a family in a small-town way of life."

Bismarck Receives Gold Medal Award

Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) has been honored with the highest and most prestigious award attainable by a park and recreation agency: the 2017 Gold Medal Award for Excellence in Park and Recreation Management.

BPRD was named one of the four finalists for the award earlier this year. The American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration, in partnership with the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) and Musco Lighting, are sponsors of this award. The announcement was made during the Opening Session of the NRPA Annual Conference Sept. 26 in New Orleans.

The Gold Medal Awards program honors communities throughout the U.S. that demonstrate excellence in parks and recreation through long-range planning, resource management, volunteerism, environmental stewardship, program development, professional development and agency recognition.

"Bismarck is already known as an amazing and supportive community. This prestigious honor recognizes the investments we are making in our programs, parks and facilities. We are very honored to be a two-time recipient of this Gold Medal Award. This places BPRD in a very rare category of park agencies, and we accept this award on behalf of the citizens of Bismarck," said BPRD Executive Director Randy Bina.

This award recognizes our past, as well as the important work we do every day with eyes on a promising future. We're both thrilled and humbled to be recognized for these efforts."

Bismarck Renovates and Upgrades Facilities

As Phase 1 of the project gets underway, involving the relocation of features of the old skatepark, located downtown next to the police station, to the new location at Kannowski Park, the park is beginning to take shape. Features from the previous location, including the tri-tiered manual pad, grind ledge and HSS grind rail, have been moved and will be incorporated into the new park's design. In addition to the relocated sections of the park, the new skatepark will have 18 new features of varying structures, levels and obstacles. The main feature of the park consists of a large radius bowl, complete with walls and features surrounding it.


Fargo Welcomes Back ND Senior Games

Public-Private Partnerships Transform Madison Park

Sometimes small requests have big, unimaginable results. In the case of Madison Park in north Fargo, a massive five-year project all started with a simple request from the Legacy Children's Foundation: could woodchips be added at the Madison Park playground? This small request evolved into a series of wonderful private-public partnerships that ultimately culminated in an enhanced experience for community members. On Aug. 16, Fargo Park District, along with the Legacy Children's Foundation and Scheels, held a grand opening for three new, noteworthy amenities at Madison Park.

The Bicycle Playground features a miniature pump track in the center of the playground surrounded by a track featuring obstacles for the beginner rider to test their skills. Scheels was instrumental in moving this project forward.

A 70-by-70 skate park intended for beginners, unlike the more advanced Dike West Skate Park in downtown Fargo, was included in the park to get individuals interested in the sport.

Intended to be reflective of families living in the neighborhood, the public art installation at Madison Park features two unique pieces. The first is the largest brick sculpture in North America, which was created by Fargo artist Brad Bachmeier. He worked with brick mason Paul Speral and neighborhood children in spring 2016 to sculpt each of the 5,000 bricks that make up the 30-foot-long lizard sculpture and brick archway. The second piece is a 10-foot-long wall mosaic created by artist Magda Szeitz and Madison Elementary art teacher Megan Johnson. The two worked together to find symbols of each culture represented in the school and neighborhood to include in the mosaic. Each child designed a square from recycled stained glass and blended them together into one cohesive design.

In addition to working closely with the Legacy Children's Foundation, the park district collaborated with multiple other individuals and organizations, including but not limited to Fargo Public Schools, City of Fargo, FM Area Foundation, Dakota Underground, Bachmeier Pottery, Paul Speral, KLJ, Houston Engineering, Thorsteinson and Sons, Hebron Brick, Superior Contracting, Strata, Camrud Foss and Progressive Bike Ramps.

Through these partnerships, Madison Park has been transformed. What once was considered a derelict part of Fargo has now been converted to a safe environment for children to play. These new amenities have proven to be more than just play things – they have served to build community and togetherness.






Roosevelt Park Zoo Receives Grant

The Minot Area Community Foundation has made its largest grant to date of \$500,000 to Minot Park District's Roosevelt Park Zoo to help build a new Amur tiger habitat.

The Roosevelt Park Zoo is the oldest zoo in North Dakota and has endured two major flood events in 1969 and 2011. We believe that the zoo, along with the park district, provide services that are vital to our quality of life and we are extremely excited to be supporting this project."
