Scholarships Available for Playground Safety Course

Learn how to ensure your community's playgrounds are safe for children by attending NDRPA's 16th annual Certified Playground Safety Inspector (CPSI) Course on March 13-15 in Bismarck, This first-class course is sponsored by the ND Parks & Recreation Department and the ND Insurance Reserve Fund (NDIRF) and hosted by the Bismarck Parks & Recreation District.

Limited scholarships are still available to NDIRF and NDRPA members (agency, professional and allied). Twenty-eight individuals will receive a full scholarship (\$410 value) to cover the course registration fee. This means members pay only the \$115 exam fee to attend. The final registration deadline for the course is Feb. 13.




Minot Upgrades Historic Corbett Field

Corbett Field has been the home to America's favorite pastime in the Magic City for more than 80 years. The field has battled flood waters, droughts and renovations. And it has given the community so many memorable moments and stories that only seem to get better by the year.

As the community grows, so do the needs of area user groups such as Minot Area Youth Baseball. Some of these needs include getting on the fields earlier in the season and more time spent on the field during the long summer days. After meeting with baseball user groups, the Minot Park Board decided to move forward with replacing the natural grass field at Corbett with synthetic turf. With funding from the City of Minot Community Facilities Fund, the park district broke ground on the project in August after the summer baseball season had concluded. The total cost of the project is just over \$1.1 million.

"We are excited for the next chapter at our historic Corbett Field," says Ron Merritt, executive director of Minot Park District. "It is an exciting time for baseball in the Magic City. We can't wait for the summer ahead."

Corbett Field is home to Minot Legion Vistas, Metros, Minot High School Magicians, Bishop Ryan High School Lions and the Minot State University Beavers, as well as home to the Sabre Dogs from the newly founded Expedition League.

Fargo Completes Staff Re-Alignment

Throughout 2017, the Fargo Park District (FPD) staff has been participating in a re-alignment process. The organization has elected to complete the realignment for greater efficiency and effectiveness of the organization; maximization of human resources full potential; greater opportunities for team members to work with a wider variety of divisions; and future growth as the organization looks to position FPD for the next 20 years.

The re-alignment process has reorganized three departments' responsibilities and titles as follows:

Enterprise Operations – Comprises revenue generating operations including golf courses, Courts Plus Community Fitness, concessions, campground and rentals. This department will be led by Carolyn Boutain, FPD's former cultural activities director.

Programming and Facilities - Encompasses all adult

and youth programs including recreation and cultural activities, facility reservations and scheduling. The director leading this department is Kevin Boe, FPD's former Courts Plus director.

Events – Includes producing athletic and cultural special events that are significant locally, as well as hosting regional/national events. This department will be led by Clay Whittlesey, FPD's former recreation and facilities director.

In addition to these three newly reorganized departments, the FPD divisions still include Finance, Human Resources, Operations and Valley Senior Services. The re-alignment also gave the organization the opportunity to establish the FPD Foundation. The newly established foundation is currently being led by Brian Arett, who also serves as the director of Valley Senior Services.

The re-alignment was implemented beginning in January. The new departments have created some restructuring of staff duties. Due to this restructuring,



you may have contact with additional members of the FPD team. FPD's staff is excited about the possibilities of this restructuring and is working to make the transition as seamless as possible to ensure continued success with NDRPA and its members.

Minot Commits \$1 Million to Zoo Campaign

Roosevelt Park Zoo received \$1 million toward the Centennial Capital Campaign in a unanimous vote by park board commissioners representing the Minot Park District. The decision brings the current total to nearly \$3.1 million, over half way to the \$5 million goal. Two new large cat habitats will be constructed simultaneously, followed by a renovation of the existing large cat habitat. A groundbreaking ceremony will be held in spring of 2018, and the project is expected to be complete in 2021, Roosevelt Park Zoo's centennial year.

Fargo Remodels Coliseum

In November, the Fargo Park District (FPD) celebrated the reopening of the John E. Carlson Coliseum after the 49-year-old facility underwent an extensive remodel. The indoor ice arena is used by local clubs and schools during hockey season, in addition to FPD programs.

The new Coliseum now boasts a regulation rink (85 feet by 200 feet), seven locker rooms, training room, referees room, seating for 500 and full Wi-Fi access. FPD is proud of the old, now new, state-of-the-art facility and is excited for what the future holds for hockey in Fargo.



Train Car Artwork Becomes Fargo's Newest Landmark

Fargo Park District (FPD), together with Fargo-Moorhead Convention and Visitors Bureau (FMCVB), unveiled the newest public art piece in Fargo in October. The piece was commissioned by North Dakota artist Steve Knutson, who painted a 40 inch by 4 inch watercolor that was then scanned and recreated on vinyl panels. The vinyl panels were installed on one of the stationary train cars located at the FPD main office building in downtown Fargo. The installation was similar to that of a vehicle wrap. The stationary train car is one of two passenger cars and caboose brought to the Depot by former FPD Executive Director Bob "Goose" Johnson.

"The Fargo Park District, together with the Fargo-Moorhead Convention and Visitors Bureau, is excited to offer this unique opportunity to introduce a public art piece in highly visible location in Fargo," shared Carolyn Boutain, FPD director of cultural activities. "Our hope is to display a piece that showcases the spirit of our community, the Fargo people and the downtown area in a setting that is truly 'North of Normal.'"

The artwork will be exhibited for at least three years. After that time, FPD and FMCVB will evaluate the program and make a determination as to the next plan for use of the trains. The piece has been incredibly well received. In fact, discussions are in the works with a local partner to install a second public art piece on the remaining passenger car. Plans are currently underway to create a landscaped viewing area for the piece. The public is invited to stop by, view the piece and share their selfies using #GreetingsFromFargo.



Naming Rights for Mandan Playing Field Approved

On Dec. 13, the Mandan Baseball Club approved the naming rights for the playing field within the Mandan Veterans Memorial Ballpark, which is now officially named BNC National Bank Field. The agreement includes official naming rights of the field in exchange for \$225,000.

BNC National Bank has always been a big supporter of Mandan. They provide local leadership and community loyalty. Mandan Park District and Mandan Baseball Club are confident in the partnership.

The BNC brand will be dominant on the field, both behind home plate and on the backside of the main grandstand facing southwest. Other sponsorship opportunities, including dugouts, press box, locker rooms, umpire room, seating, storage and grandstands, are available throughout the ballpark.

Earlier this year, the Mandan Park Board of Commissioners approved spending \$1.25 million to address the synthetic turf as the ballpark's immediate need and the two dugouts as the secondary need,

if funding allows. Mandan Park District has donated \$750,000 and Mandan Baseball Club \$500,000. The organizations strive to provide Mandan youth with athletic success and the opportunity to learn valuable life lessons through baseball.

Mandan Park District will advertise bids starting in the spring of 2018. The estimated project completion is prior to winter 2018.





More Than \$100,000 Raised for Grand Forks' New Skatepark

In Grand Forks, Rydell Cars has raised more than \$100,000 at the Rydell 12th Annual Car and Bike Show, an amount that surpassed previous years. The funds raised featured all proceeds from the event, combined with a \$40,000 corporate match from Rydell Cars. Rydell is donating the funds to Grand Forks' new skatepark project. "Through the generous pledged donations of our community, a relocated, updated skatepark will provide skaters of all ages and their families a safe place to gather," stated Executive Director Bill Palmiscno. The Grand Forks Park District and Grand Forks Parks and Recreation Foundation (Foundation) are honored to be the recipient of the event's charitable donation. Because of this generous contribution, the project is nearing the financial finish line, getting the project one step closer to bringing benefits to the Grand Forks community.

Seeing a need to provide skaters of all ages with a safe place to gather, the Skatepark Committee and the Foundation created a vision for change many years ago. Phase 1 of the project has been underway, involving the relocation of features of the old skatepark, located downtown next to the police station, to the new location at Kannowski Park.



Bismarck Opens Capital Ice Complex

On Nov. 29, Bismarck Parks and Recreation District's (BPRD) new Capital Ice Complex opened its doors to the public for its grand opening. The Capital Ice Complex features the familiar but renovated Schaumberg Arena and the all new Wachter Arena.

Schaumberg Arena has six new locker rooms and an expanded lobby on the south end of the building for improved indoor traffic flow. A new mezzanine addition provides a view of both ice rinks. Also new in the complex are three community rooms, a dryland training area, puck shooting area, storage spaces, concessions, a new lobby with ticket sales and skate rentals, and offices for the local ice skating and hockey clubs.

Wachter Arena has six new locker rooms, officials' locker rooms, stadium seating for 490, and new restrooms for the complex and Wachter Park users. The compressors in the Wachter Arena feature the newest technology in ice refrigeration, and the Wachter Arena is the first facility in the continental United States to install it.

The new Capital Ice Complex is part of the Wachter Park Master Plan, which includes additional parking, a new picnic shelter, new sidewalk connections, new shade structures and a new Magical Moments playground. Finishing touches to Wachter Park will be completed in the spring.

"This complex was created with wonderful public and private partnerships. The Bismarck Hockey Boosters and the Bismarck Figure Skating Club made substantial donations to the project, along with the Chad and Stacy Wachter family. Over \$3.8 million was raised to help create more opportunities for kids and for the public," said Randy Bina, BPRD executive director. "We're very proud of the complex and are excited for the community to come see it." The original Schaumberg Arena was built in 1974 and

has been home to public skating, high school hockey, youth hockey, figure skating and, during the summer months, the Triple Star Day Camp program.


NDPRD Seeking Applicants for **RTP Advisory Committee**

COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

Mark Weber has served on the Linton Park Board since 2004 and is currently the vice president. He joined the park board in an effort to have a voice in saving the local swimming pool, a facility built in 1956, and a park right outside of town that had been in use since 1918.

Weber's goals as a park board member include keeping the city pool and park maintained so the community, as well as visitors, can enjoy them. The park, located approximately two miles from Linton, had been the hub of the community for many years for July 4 celebrations, family reunions and other gatherings. Weber would like to see the community expand the use of the park.

The biggest challenge park board members face, in Weber's opinion, is financial hardships when trying to keep facilities up to date and in service. Maintaining an outdoor swimming pool is expensive, as is the maintenance of Linton's park. Weber noted, "I feel our park board has done an excellent job of updating and maintaining our facilities, but there are always new projects or things that can be added to make them better."

Weber feels NDRPA is beneficial to park board members because being affiliated with NDRPA gives local park boards a better opportunity to apply for grants

and other funding for maintenance or improvement projects. He said board members also get the opportunity to see what other communities are doing to improve their parks and facilities.

Some of Weber's favorite recreation and park activities include swimming and walking. He said, "I am an avid swimmer and use our pool frequently during the summer months. I also like to walk, and our community has a paved walking path from Linton to the park, about one and a half miles."

The Linton Park Board has undertaken major projects in the last few years. "We recently added seven

campsites with full hook-ups in the park that have been used frequently," Weber said. "Last year, we added rural water to get rid of the wells and will be installing a septic/sewer system before next summer." Weber also said the park was severely damaged by a flood in 2009. He said, "We were compelled to raze a pavilion that was built in 1919, but we were able to repair or replace other damaged structures in the park through FEMA funding." The Linton Park Board also renovated the swimming pool, a \$750,000 project, which was funded by a 1 percent sunset clause sales tax and paid off in 2016. Other projects include widening the entry road to the park and adding a new bridge crossing over Beaver Creek.



Council Updates Hall of Fame Nomination Requirements and Encourages Nominations

The NDRPA Hall of Fame Council has revised the Hall of Fame nomination requirements and process to reflect the following:

- The due date for nominations has been changed to July 15.
- A letter of support from a Hall of Fame member or Hall of Fame Council member will be required as part of the nomination requirements.
- One black and white 8x10 photo, bust only, in high resolution format (minimum 300 dpi), must be supplied electronically with the nomination.
- The current NDRPA Past President will no longer be a required Council member and serve as secretary.

- Council meetings and votes may be undertaken by any means of communication.
- The Council will be responsible for the Hall of Fame induction ceremony at the Awards Banquet.

NDRPA honors individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the parks and recreation field in North Dakota, based on a reputable performance attested to a personal record of accomplishment. Hall of Fame recipients are announced and recognized at the NDRPA Annual Awards Banquet. Recipients receive a plaque, and another plaque is displayed at the ND Sports Hall of Fame in Jamestown.

Take Advantage of Outdoor Heritage Fund **Grant Opportunities**

The purpose of the ND Outdoor Heritage Fund (OHF) is to provide funding to state agencies, tribal governments, political subdivisions and nonprofit organizations, with higher priority given to conservation practices in North Dakota by:

Directive A. Providing access to private and public lands for sportsmen, including projects that create fish and wildlife habitat and provide access for sportsmen;

Directive B. Improving, maintaining and restoring water quality, soil conditions, plant diversity, animal systems and by supporting other practices of stewardship to enhance farming and ranching;

Directive C. Developing, enhancing, conserving and restoring wildlife and fish habitat on private and public lands; and

Directive D. Conserving natural areas and creating other areas for recreation through the establishment and development of parks and other recreation areas.

The OHF recently completed its 10th grant cycle. To date, more than \$32 million has been awarded to 117 OHF projects.

Check the OHF website at www.nd.gov/ndic/outdoorinfopage.htm to see the complete and varied list of funded projects that benefit the North Dakota outdoors. The OHF has been extremely positive for North Dakota's outdoor recreation, providing funds for 38 projects (32 percent of the total projects) in Directive D, totaling more than \$5 million.

The remaining application deadlines in this biennium are April 1, 2018, Oct. 1, 2018, and May 1, 2019. Please visit the website and consider applying for a project that fits within the guidelines of the program. Adequate funding remains and improvements to North Dakota's outdoor recreation benefit so many of our citizens. Feel free to contact me with any questions at rbina@bisparks.org.







NRPA Poll: Americans Turn to Parks and Recreation to Cope with "Winter Blues"


Depending on where you live, finding a way to cope with the "winter blues" can be difficult. That's why, according to a recent poll conducted by the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA), more and more Americans are turning to their local parks and recreation centers to stave off the winter blues. Among the 80 percent of Americans that plan to do something to cope with the winter blues this season:

- 44 percent plan to surround themselves with family and friends, such as at a local park or recreation center
- 32 percent plan to stay active by exercising indoors, such as at a gym, local recreation center or through indoor sports
- 25 percent plan to go outdoors for leisure or to stay active, such as at a local park or trail
- 16 percent plan to pick up a new hobby or take a class, such as at a local recreation center

Overall, parents (88 percent) are significantly more likely to do something to cope with the winter blues as opposed to non-parents (76 percent).

"The benefits of parks go beyond promoting good physical health," said Barbara Tulipane, NRPA president and CEO. "Parks provide mental health benefits as well, through the use of green space and nature-based activities that foster a sense of community."

Living close to parks and other recreation facilities is consistently related to higher physical activity levels for both adults and youth. Moreover, parks provide a connection to nature, which studies demonstrate relieves stress levels, tightens interpersonal relationships



and improves mental health.
