All members are encouraged to attend.

Scholarships Available for CPSI Course

NDRPA is excited to host the 19th annual Certified Playground Safety Inspector (CPSI) Course on Oct. 12-14 in Bismarck. Participants have the opportunity to learn about the latest developments in playground safety through classroom instruction and hands-on site investigation during this two-day course. Individuals interested in becoming a certified playground safety inspector may take the optional exam on the third day. Limited scholarships are available to North Dakota Insurance Reserve Fund (NDIRF) and NDRPA members (agency, professional and allied).

Sponsorships from the North Dakota Parks & Recreation Department and the NDIRF make this first-class course possible. The event is hosted by the Bismarck Parks & Recreation District. The final course registration deadline is Sept. 10. The course schedule and registration details are available at www.ndrpa.com. Additional safety precautions will be required:



This much-needed facility replaced the main shop built in 1960 and provides the BPRD Operations Division better efficiency in maintaining more than 3,400 acres of park land throughout the district.

The 10,913-square-foot building includes a





reception/lobby area, offices, conference room, break room, locker room, two pull-through maintenance bays, two working bays, wash bay, vehicle lift, equipment lift, overhead equipment crane and mezzanine storage. The building cost was \$2.3 million.

FPD has switched from its previous system, MaxGalaxy, to a new registration software system called PerfectMind. The new PerfectMind software is user-friendly, allowing users to register for programs and activities on any device (desktop or mobile) at any time of day.

PerfectMind benefits for the public include the ability to have immediate registration, receive instant registration confirmations and receipts, view course/program information, manage an account online, view program availability, check current and past registrations, and no convenience fees. All customers new and old are required to create a new account.

PerfectMind benefits for the FPD team are affordability, a new clean look and all-inclusive software for registration and scheduling. The new software also stores all FPD contracts digitally, allowing the public and FPD team to view signed contracts online.

In 2022, FPD will add its shelter rentals and pool passes to PerfectMind. This will make all pool passes electronic, removing the need of having sewn-on patches.



"I've had 47 great years with the park district. It has been an honor

working with so many wonderful people over the years, and I have really enjoyed helping to provide recreation opportunities for the kids of Grand Forks," said Bill Palmiscno. "I look forward to retiring so I can spend more time with my family."

Over the years, Palmiscno has played a significant role within the GFPD. Hired in December 1973 as the arena director, Palmiscno moved into various leadership roles at the park district including recreation director, superintendent of parks and

Legacy of Grand Forks Golf Legend, Nancy Koch, Lives on At King's Walk

Nancy Koch loved the game of golf. She played it passionately, winning the Grand Forks City Tournament numerous times and was inducted into the North Dakota Women's Golf Association Hall of Fame in 1989. She had a competitive drive when playing the game and a passion for seeing others learn and grow in their golf game, which is why two annual events have been established at King's Walk Golf Course in her honor.

Wanting to see the golf game and courses in the area grow and succeed, Koch was always willing to give her time, resources and knowledge to new and young golfers. Since her passing in 2017, Koch's

friends and family have been working every year to keep all she embraced about the spirit of golf alive in Grand Forks. Returning for its third year, the Free Introductory Kids Clinic, held on June 7, provided children ages 6-11 years old an opportunity to try out the game, hopefully sparking early interest in this great lifelong sport.

In addition to providing an opportunity for youth, King's Walk Golf Course proudly hosted the 4th Annual Nancy Koch Memorial Golf Outing on July 29. In 2020, the event raised nearly \$3,000 for youth golf programs and Neurological Research. By either attending or making a charitable donation,

Tod Time at the Waterpark

Every Monday in July, Mandan Parks and Recreation offered Tod Time at Raging Rivers Waterpark. Tod Time allows children ages 0-8, along with adult supervision (adults were required to also be in water), to enter the park from 10 - 11:30 a.m. During that time, the Aqua Play Unit was the only available structure for guests to play with a more exclusive group outside the normal operating hours. Admission was \$5 per person. If patrons wanted to stay at the park for the remainder of the day, they were required to exit the park at 11:30 a.m. and stand in line at the ticket window to regain access into the park. This was Mandan Parks and Recreation's second year offering Tod Time.

Toptracer Range Opens in Bismarck

Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) installed Toptracer Range technology in 10 indoor driving bays at the Fore Seasons Center at the end of June. This is the same ball-tracking technology that traces the shots of golfers on TV. It offers a fun, engaging, tech-driven experience that appeals to seasoned players, range rivals, friends, family members, and even first-time golfers.

BPRD offered free 30-minute sessions for two weeks of its July Celebration to allow people to test drive the new Toptracer Range. Starting July 26, customers can make reservations in 30-minute increments to play a round of virtual golf, challenge a friend to a game of longest drive or closest to the pin, or simply hit some practice shots.

Pop-Up Park Activities Encourage Community Engagement

This year for National Park and Recreation Month, Fargo Park District (FPD) encouraged its community to engage with FPD through Pop-Up Park Activities. Each week throughout the month of July, FPD dropped off a new activity in a different park location. FPD released each activity on its social media pages and encouraged the community to grab a free item and share photos of themselves using the item on social media with the hashtag "FargoParks." years in the U.S. Air Force.





2020 NDRPA AWARDS HIGHLIGHT

CITIZEN ADVOCACY AWARD

The North Dakota Recreation and Park Association's (NDRPA) Citizen Advocacy Award honors individuals for outstanding contributions to the park, recreation and conservation movement through education and activating the public in their community, state or at the national level.

An individual who exemplifies advocacy on behalf of all North Dakota's park and recreation agencies is Dana Schaar Jahner.

Schaar Jahner served as the very first executive director of NDRPA from 2007-2019. She also served as the project manager for the North Dakota Park and Recreation Department's (NDPRD) 2013-2017 and 2018-2022 State Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plans (SCORP) and the 2014-2019 North Dakota Scenic Byway Program Strategic Plan.

During Schaar Jahner's service, NDRPA had many accomplishments:

Each year, the association published its quarterly magazine, *FOCUS*, and biennially published the Professional Directory.

During the 2009 state legislative session, NDRPA was able to introduce and pass a bill that raised the bid requirements for park districts from \$10,000 to \$25,000.

In 2010, the organization launched the NDRPA *eUpdate*, a monthly electronic newsletter to supplement *FOCUS*. The organization also added a commercial membership category and had nine commercial members join the first year it was offered.

During the 2011 state legislative session, NDRPA was successful in supporting legislation that raised the concession bidding requirement from \$500 to \$25,000. NDRPA also adopted a new logo in 2011 and created a short video to help market the organization to students in the parks and recreation field.

In 2012, NDRPA co-hosted the first-ever North Dakota Trails Conference with NDPRD. This collaborative conference continued for eight years and resulted in a combined conference with NDRPA this year.

During the 2013 state legislative session, NDRPA was part of a coalition that supported creation of an Outdoor Heritage Fund of up to \$30 million for the biennium to be used for conservation and recreation efforts in the state. NDRPA also worked successfully with other political subdivision associations to oppose many bills that negatively impacted park districts,

such as caps on property tax levies and limits on building authorities.

In November 2013, the association completed a multi-year project to determine the economic contribution of state and local public parks and recreation in North Dakota. The project was the joint effort of NDRPA, 12 local park districts and NDPRD, and the research was conducted by North Dakota State University's Department of Agribusiness and Applied Economics. The total annual economic contribution of these agencies was estimated at \$802 million.

In 2014, two task forces were formed to work on issues of importance to NDRPA members: a university task force aimed at building a stronger relationship between state colleges/universities with recreation-related degree programs and NDRPA; and a track meet task force developed to continue a statewide program as the Hershey's program was discontinued.

During the 2015 state legislative session, NDRPA supported funding for parks and recreation through the Outdoor Heritage Fund and Community Grant Program. The association also supported the Governor's property tax levy consolidation for political subdivisions and worked successfully with other political subdivisions to oppose bills that negatively impacted park districts, such as additional notifications of property tax increases and changes to assessment projects.

In 2015, NDRPA filled Memorial Hall with exhibits

showcasing the value and benefits of parks and recreation in March during Parks Day at the Capitol. The association continued to host Parks Day each following legislative session. Beginning in 2017, Parks Day was held in partnership with NDPRD.

In 2016, for the first time, NDRPA adopted a legislative platform in preparation for the 2017 state legislative session. A member meeting was held in November to discuss the legislative process and key policy issues impacting parks and recreation.

During the 2017 legislative session, although it was a challenging session due to the significant state revenue shortfall, the association worked successfully with other political subdivisions to oppose bills that negatively impacted park districts, such as budget caps.

With support from the North Dakota Insurance Reserve Fund (NDIRF), the association updated and expanded the *North Dakota Park Board Manual* (first published in 1985) in 2008, 2015 and 2018 to reflect the most accurate and up-to-date information. NDRPA also hosted a summer 2018 training webinar based on the manual for park board commissioners.

During the 2019 state legislative session, NDRPA worked successfully to pass a number

of bills, including increasing the park district bid threshold, allowing approval of park district general obligation bonds with a protest period, and ensuring park districts have the ability to protest special assessments approved by other political subdivisions.

Each year, NDRPA has hosted a playground safety program in the spring. From 2007-2010, the National Playground Safety Institute was offered. Beginning in 2011, the Certified Playground Safety Inspector course has been offered.

For her efforts in leading NDRPA with confidence and professionalism; for her dedication to the parks, recreation and conservation cause; for her commitment to positively impacting legislative policy on behalf of all of North Dakota's park districts; and for her leadership, passion and compassion, NDRPA was pleased to award Dana Schaar Jahner the 2020 Citizen Advocacy Award in September 2020.

Today, Schaar Jahner continues her work in the parks and recreation field. She joined Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) in April 2021 as the district's new community relations manager, where she continues to advocate for the important role of public parks and recreation in Bismarck.

NDPRD Launches North Dakota Passport Program



The North Dakota

recently introduced the
North Dakota Passport
Program. The goal of the

new program is to help residents and out-of-state travelers make the most of their visits to recreational and historical sites throughout the state. The program is similar to other programs at state and national levels that have been popular among travelers. The North Dakota Passport is an all-in-one guide to adventure as users collect stamps at 37 featured destinations, varying from state parks and recreation areas to state historic sites and museums. All 37 locations have a designated outdoor Passport Station where users can transfer the stamp with a pencil or crayon. Additionally, staffed locations have a stamp available in park offices, visitor centers or museums.

"Last year, the state parks saw a significant increase in visitation, and many first-time users found enjoyment in outdoor recreation and realized the importance of the parks. We hope this program continues to inspire new users and helps long-time visitors experience the state parks and recreation areas in new ways," said Andrea Travnicek, NDPRD director. "With rising interest in outdoor recreation and road trips, it's the perfect time to launch this adventure guidebook in support of tourism and economic growth in communities near the state parks and

across the state."


The North Dakota Passport can be purchased at 13 state parks and 11 state






