Kale Stromme - Devils Lake Park Board

Kale Stromme took his first job with the Devils Lake Park Board as a lifeguard when he was 15 years old. Little did he know then he would eventually have a role in shaping the city's recreational plans as a board member. Stromme was first elected in 2010 and is serving a third term on the board.

"I really saw how important

parks and recreation was for a community," said Stromme, who graduated from the University of North Dakota with a degree in business management and a minor in recreation and leisure services. "Throughout my time working in the field and learning in college about the field, I found that parks and recreation services are an important aspect of people's lives. I valued it personally and I felt that I wanted to be involved with trying to improve the services we are providing in our community."

Stromme has served the park board through some trying times that included a lengthy flood fight and recent COVID-19 pandemic. He says the key to success is being able to adapt when situations change. For instance, Stromme and the board worked with Fort Totten Little Theater to move its annual indoor show into a park in Devils Lake and it now serves as an outdoor community theater. "It



was such a hit that they have continued to do the show and this year had just shy of 7,000 people attend, which was a record." Stromme said. "It was exciting to attend and see the park so busy. Many nights while the show was going on, there was volleyball, baseball and softball going on at the same time as well."

Stromme has also kept his focus on

other activities that matter to the people of Devils Lake, like the annual Lure 'em for Life Kid's Fishing Camp. Volunteers from the North Dakota Game and Fish Department take kids out fishing and do daily activities such as fish identification, knot tying and fish cleaning.

The park district also recently installed a dock system at Creel Bay Golf Course to allow people to park their boats and enjoy a game of golf or enjoy the lake view and have a beverage. Other pending upgrades include significant improvements to the community's largest baseball field, replacing a pavilion in the park and looking for ways to make a community recreation center a reality.

"After multiple surveys, we know our community wants a new center, but we need to figure out what the right mix of wants are to the cost of the facility," Stromme said.

Stromme said North Dakota Recreation and Park Association resources help park commissioners and park employees make informed decisions when facing issues in their community. "It is a great resource for us to use to see what other parks are doing and keep up with park trends in our state," he said.



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Bina Retires After Four Decades of Parks and Recreation Service

Randy Bina retired as executive director of Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) on Oct. 1. His service to the public parks and recreation field spanned four decades and included almost 34 years with BPRD, the last 10 years as executive director.

Throughout his career, Bina was

a leader in parks and recreation, engaged locally, regionally and nationally in numerous professional and sports organizations. He was active in NDRPA, serving as president twice. He was inducted into the NDRPA Hall of Fame in 2011 and continues to serve as chair of the Hall of Fame Council post-retirement.

"Parks and recreation is both a passion and profession for me," Bina says. "I express my deepest gratitude to the many people who have supported me throughout my career, including current and former park board commissioners and staff members, parks and recreation professionals across the state and around the country, and my family."

Bina was instrumental in expanding the impact of BPRD in the community by building collaborative partnerships, supporting successful capital campaigns, hosting sporting events, and developing neighborhood parks and new facilities.

"Randy's commitment to planning and partner outreach have greatly benefited the park district," Board of Park Commissioners President Julie Jeske says. "He leaves a strong legacy for our continued work to provide public parks and recreation services in Bismarck."

Mandan Upgrading Dacotah Centennial Park

The Mandan Park District is making major upgrades to Dacotah Centennial Park, home to Mandan's annual Fourth of July Rodeo, Mandan Horse and Saddle Club, Dacotah Speedway, 20 campsite hookups, community gardens, and 16 acres of soccer fields, including three varsity and 12 youth fields. Annually, more than 30 events with approximately 17,000 patrons utilize the facility.

The district is partnering with the Mandan Rodeo Days Committee and Mandan Horse and Saddle Club to create an improved joint use facility. The Mandan Rodeo Days Committee is responsible for the cost of the new arena. Mandan Park District and Mandan Rodeo Days Committee partnered to secure a \$750,000 donation from Dale Pahlke, Dakota Community Bank & Trust, and a \$1 million commitment from the city's Mandan Visitors Fund to directly benefit infrastructure improvements at Dacotah Centennial Park.

Since 1991, the Mandan Park District staff and Mandan Rodeo Days Committee have set up a temporary arena on the stock car racing track in front of the speedway's grandstand for the July rodeo. The project will result in a permanent, spectator-friendly home for a major annual community event while also enhancing facilities for a multitude of youth rodeos, equine competitions, riding clinics, and other activities.

The improved facility will now be known as the

Dale Pahlke Arena on the Dakota Community Bank & Trust Rodeo Grounds. The facility will feature a larger arena with improved drainage, new fencing and gates, new announcer stand, audio visual system, 4,000-seat grandstand, livestock pens, contestant warm-up area, future exhibit hall, and a maintenance/storage shed. Dacotah Centennial Park updates will include accommodating ADA upgrades to bleachers and LED lighting throughout the facility.

Mandan Park District is working with Icon Architectural Group to construct the project. The goal is to have the facility ready by the Fourth of July in 2022.

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Minot Park District and Rotary Team Up to Offer Kayak Rentals

The Minot Park District and Minot Noon Rotary Club are making kayak rentals available through a "Rotary 4 Recreation" campaign that started in October 2020. Proceeds from T-shirts sales through the program allowed for the purchase of six kayaks, paddles and life jackets.

"We are thrilled to donate these items to the Minot Park District to encourage outdoor activities like kayaking in our community. We look forward to our

continued partnership and bringing more recreational activities to the region," Rotary 4 Recreation Committee member Staci Kenney said.

Kayaks are available to rent through the Minot Park District's recreation office. The cost is \$10 per kayak per day. That includes paddle and life jacket. It is on a first-come, first-served basis. Renters must have their own means of transportation and proper equipment to secure the kayaks while transporting. Payment is due at the time of rental. Kayaks are available for pick-up Monday-Friday, noon-4:30 p.m. Rentals are 24 hours, pick-up is any time after noon and drop off is anytime between 8 a.m. and noon the following day. If past noon the following day, renters will be charged for a second day at drop-off. There is no pick-up or drop-off on Saturday or Sunday. Friday rentals are three-day rentals only (\$30).

Ron Merritt, executive director of the Minot Park District, said, "We are excited to work with the Minot Noon Rotary Club on this project. The Souris River is a recreational opportunity just waiting for our community to enjoy. Our goal is to continue to grow this program with more recreational offerings along the Souris River."

Klipfel Begins New Role as Executive Director of Bismarck Parks and Recreation District

Kevin Klipfel began his service as executive director of Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) on Oct. 2. Klipfel was previously the BPRD facilities and programs director.

He has a degree in parks and recreation administration from the University of North Dakota and started his public parks and recreation career 30 years ago at BPRD as a recreation specialist. Throughout his career, Klipfel has held leadership positions in Valley City and Dickinson, before returning to his hometown and BPRD. Klipfel is a Certified Park and Recreation Executive and a Certified Playground Safety

Inspector. In 2019, he received the Distinguished Professional Award from the North Dakota Recreation and Park Association.

"The board of park commissioners conducted a national search for the executive director position, and Kevin rose to the top of the candidates with his professionalism, experience and understanding of the community," says board president Julie Jeske. "Kevin's knowledge of the park district and expertise in the field ensures a smooth transition for staff and community partners. Kuntz has been an active NDRPA member for 35 years and was passionate about the importance of his job. "North Dakota citizens and visitors should receive an outstanding return on spending for leisure opportunities," Kuntz said. "It is important to the overall health of our citizens and builds a sense of community. Our profession provides a vital role in the quality of life."

Kuntz earned a bachelor's degree from Minnesota State University Moorhead in 1983. He spent most


of his career with Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD), and also worked briefly for the Moorhead Parks and Recreation Department and Dickinson Parks and Recreation. Kuntz retired in 2019 from BPRD where he was recreation manager. He was a certified park and recreation professional and a certified playground safety inspector.

Throughout his career, Kuntz has been active in his profession and in his community. Among the many organizations in which he has participated are Babe Ruth League, North Dakota Amateur Basketball, North Dakota Amateur Softball Association, Prairie Rose State Games, and Bismarck Soccer League. He has been recognized twice with a VIP Award from the Bismarck-Mandan Convention and Visitors Bureau and is a member of the North Dakota Babe Ruth Hall of Fame.

Kuntz has earned accolades from his peers:

Kuntz was active in NDRPA leadership, serving on multiple committees and holding several offices, among them secretary, FOCUS editor, membership chair, and president. He was a member of the planning committee for NDRPA's joint conference with the South Dakota Parks & Recreation Association and a member of the review committee that hired the first NDRPA executive director. Kuntz also represented NDRPA as its professional representative

to the NRPA Midwest Regional Network. He was recognized previously by NDRPA with the Fellow Award, now known as the Distinguished Professional Award, in 2003.

Dennis Nybo, director of New Rockford Park District, was the 25th inductee into the NDRPA Hall of Fame.

For 32 years, Nybo has worked to make sure diverse recreational opportunities are available to everyone. That's why he could always be found serving on boards and associations whose missions were to promote fun, healthy activities.

"Each individual is unique and has different expectations," Nybo said. "For some, it may be a park bench to enjoy nature, for others, swimming or baseball. Both are important needs to be met for all community members and guests."

Nybo earned a bachelor's degree in parks and recreation administration from the University of North Dakota in 1988. He has worked for several parks and recreation agencies throughout his career, including Rolling Meadows Park District in Illinois, Bismarck Parks and Recreation District and Devils Lake Park District. He is a certified park and recreation professional and a certified pool operator.

Nybo has been actively involved in many sports associations, including Prairie Rose State Games, North Dakota Amateur Basketball, National ASA Softball, North Dakota Amateur Hockey Association, and USA National Hockey. He also is a member

of the New Rockford Eagles, has officiated hockey and been active in school booster clubs. He has received the Outstanding Local Program/Volunteer Award from the National Hershey's Track and Field Program.

Fargo's Island Park Undergoes Master Plan

Island Park is the oldest park in Fargo, part of the original townsite of Fargo plotted out by the Northern Pacific Railroad. The Fargo Park District is looking to celebrate the park's history and increase public awareness of Island Park's amenities and natural beauty by undertaking a future-focused master plan for the park.

The Fargo Park District received four proposals for Island Park master planning services. Fargo Parks staff reviewed and scored the four proposals and interviewed two firms. After the interviews, staff recommended and the park board ultimately approved AGL Landscape Architects & RDG Planning and Design (AGL & RDG) for master planning services for Island Park.

At the October board meeting, the board made one change to the timeline. The original plan was for the Island Park Master Plan to be completed in tandem with the remodel and replacement of the more than 40-year-old Island Park Pool, due to the age and condition of the pool. However, input from the Fargo community and Island Park

neighborhood during the planning process for the pool project asked for the Island Park Master Plan to be completed before the Island Park Pool project. The change in timeline allows for pool architectural and engineering design services to be engaged as part of the master plan process.


The vision is for a master plan that respects the existing natural beauty while thoughtfully guiding future long- and near-term park improvements with guidelines for phased implementation. The master plan will define the park's future by generating ideas for unique artistic and cultural features not found in other area parks.

Over the next six months, AGL & RDG will undergo a process of data collection and basemapping to prepare inventory and analysis maps of information related to cultural and historical elements, parking, pedestrian use, programming use, the arts-related marketplace in the FM area, access, safety, natural elements, and existing structures. A project steering team comprised of park district staff, community

stakeholders and user groups will be assembled to draft plan goals, objectives and priorities as well as discuss project schedule and public participation. AGL & RDG will develop an online public participation platform as well as facilitate open-house design workshops. Utilizing the information they've gathered throughout the process, AGL & RDG will prepare a draft master plan of Island Park with recommendations for implementation in 5-, 10-, 15-, & 20-year phase increments. This drafted master plan will be presented to the public by the design team for feedback and refinement. The project will close out with a meeting with Fargo Park District staff and steering team to debrief and discuss implementation and next steps.

Fargo Park District looks forward to working with AGL & RDG on the master plan process for one of its community gems. The planned outcome is a re-envisioned park that complements the exuberance of reemerged downtown Fargo, is a destination to a broader audience and enhances connections to the Red River and adjacent neighborhoods.







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Success Story | Alexander Park Cold Spring, MN

Next to the picturesque Sauk River and close to downtown, the city of Cold Spring, MN couldn't have asked for a better location for a new park.

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
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Veterans Memorial Park Opens in Grand Forks

Nearly 10 years in the making, the Grand Forks Park District's Veterans Memorial Park was officially opened and dedicated on Sept. 11 in front of nearly 1,500 onlookers.

Speakers included former UND Aerospace UAS Program Director Al Palmer, Mayor Brandon Bochenski, UND President Andrew Armacost, and North Dakota Adjutant General Major Gen. Al Dorhmann. The ceremony also included remarks by Grand Forks Air Force Base 319th Wing Commander Col. Timothy Curry, who shared his memories of 9/11 and his role as part of the team that killed Osama Bin Laden.

In addition to the decorated and honorable speakers, the Red River Valley Motorcyclists positioned 13 bikes, which were draped with the U.S. flag by members of the UND ROTC program during the ceremony, in memory of those servicemen and women who lost their lives in the recent U.S. evacuation of Afghanistan. Each deceased person's name was read by Palmer.


The 90-minute ceremony recognized the hard work of the Veterans Memorial Park (VMP) Committee over the last decade, as well as the donors who made it all possible. In total, more than \$2 million (land not included), was raised by nearly 200 individuals and organizations over the years. These efforts have made for the creation of a one-of-a-kind park that features:


- Five obelisks representing each of the five branches of military service
- An educational Memorial Granite Wall with laseretched images to depict the American veteran role from the first wars and conflicts to the latest electronic warfare
- An anchor from the USS Kiska, a Navy ammunition ship that saw service during the Vietnam War
- 1,200 personalized and engraved memorial stones to honor loved ones who have served or are currently serving
- Park shelters and benches for meditation and reflection
- Replica models of military aircrafts, with future development incorporating additional military equipment

Through community philanthropy and the tireless work of local veterans and the VMP Committee, the Veterans Memorial Park will now forever be a sacred gathering place for veterans, military members, families, and community members to celebrate, recognize, remember, and honor the lives of those who are serving or have served in the United States Military. The VMP Committee is still seeking to raise about \$100,000 for finishing touches to complete the park's full plan.







Grand Forks Celebrates Rydell Regional Skate Park Phase 2

The Grand Forks Park District celebrated Phase 2 of the Rydell Skatepark at Kannowski Park on Sept. 18. Featuring an open skate session, food and music, giveaways, prize drawings, and skate competitions, hundreds gathered to celebrate the near completion of this unique regional park.

"Phase two has only been complete for a few weeks and we are already seeing visitors from all over the area traveling to Grand Forks to use the skatepark," said Jill Nelson, director of operations and community relations for the Grand Forks Park District. "With features like a skate bowl, quarter pipes, ramps, a vertical wall, and more, Grand Forks is now on the map for having a destination skatepark in our region."

The first phase, completed in 2018, cost \$350,000 and the second phase cost \$450,000 with roughly 90% of funds raised through donations resulting from grants, the generosity of community members and the dedication of Grand Forks Park District Foundation's Skatepark Committee. The project received a \$196,000 community development block grant from the city of Grand Forks, a \$100,000

donation from the Engelstad Foundation and just over \$100,000 from the 2017 Rydell Car Show, in addition to donations from a number of other businesses and local entities.

With a few final plans to finish the last touches of the park (i.e., grading, seeding and fencing) the destination skatepark can now be fully enjoyed by skaters, roller bladers and scooter enthusiasts alike for many years to come.





Fargo Park District Hosts Another Successful 'Lab'

For the third year, the Fargo Park District held a STEM-focused science event called The Lab. The event is for elementary kids ages 7-12. The Lab transforms Rheault Farm into a science lab for a day full of fun experiments. The specific science focus changes year to year. The focus of the 2021 event was geology and biology.

Local college professor Graeme R. A. Wyllie, Ph. D., and the Concordia College Science Academy partnered with the district. Wyllie and his students created the science experiments and taught them while the district provided the space and supplies.

In 2020, The Lab was held virtually instead of in-person. Videos of each experiment were created for families to do at home. That event was done primarily through Facebook with 400 event responses and 15 active participants. Event participants could also access The Lab videos on YouTube.

The in-person event has grown from 50 to 200 participants. It is great to see a specific STEM-themed event have such high attendance.



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Bismarck Sees Efficiencies with New Playground Inspection Software

The Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) Operations Division transitioned from a paper to an electronic playground inspection process this summer.

BPRD now uses CityReporterTM software for both high-frequency and low-frequency playground inspections. Staff utilize tablets in the field to perform inspections using BPRD's own checklist, which was imported into the software. Any deficiencies on the playground equipment are captured by the tablet camera, complete with geolocation, and the photos are tied directly to the inspection checklist. When staff return to the office, the inspection data is uploaded to the cloud via WiFi, and emails are sent to the appropriate staff for review.

The new system has not only streamlined the entire

process but also created significant efficiencies. Prior to digitization, staff performed all inspections on paper, without the benefit of images, which resulted in significant hard copy files. In addition, no longer does the reviewing supervisor have to travel onsite to view each playground deficiency identified by a staff member. The photos tied to the inspection checklist also provide for quicker communication with the manufacturer for parts. This results in faster replacement of any issues and therefore safer playgrounds for the community.

The system has proven to be user-friendly. Staff not accustomed to utilizing tablets for work were able to pick up the technology quickly.

The software offers the possibility of adding other BPRD inspection checklists in the future.
