Recently, a local blogger wrote an article regarding our Roosevelt Park Pool here in Minot. My husband sent me the link last week and as I clicked on it, I honestly didn't know what to expect. Her article referred to the Roosevelt Park Pool as its own community, a place where people go to meet their neighbors, for kids to reconnect with school friends they haven't seen in a while, and even a place to make new friends.

After reading that article, I decided to load up our girls that evening and bring them to the Roosevelt Park Pool. We took in the pool from the perspective of a park patron. I watched as our 13-year-old walked in, and seeing school friends, immediately looked the other direction. She was slightly embarrassed or possibly mortified that she was seen at the pool with her mom and 9-year-old sister. Our

carefree 9-year-old cannonballed into the deep end while getting yelled at by the lifeguard to stop running. Rae found a new "best friend" within minutes. But when I asked her new friend's name, she shrugged her shoulders followed by "I don't know."



There were grandparents with grandkids, couples, teenagers, and a mom arguing with her 3-year-old about why they were not stopping at Dairy Queen on the way home. By all accounts, I would say it was an average 80-degree North Dakota evening at the pool. I envisioned similar pool experiences were being shared in all the "big towns" and "small towns" across the state.

To the average person, that trip to the pool seems routine. They don't know the months of work that goes into hiring lifeguards, lifeguard certifications, CPO training, filling the pool, and hoping everything operates the same as it did when we drained it last fall, or the inevitable sleepless nights that come with being responsible for hundreds of swimmers every year. But that's why we do what we do. We get to provide our citizens with prime facilities and experiences every day. We get to create an environment for them to make new memories with families and a place to meet new friends even if they don't remember their names.

Thank you all for your countless hours making North Dakota a better place to live, work and play. Thanks for creating little communities inside our cities that make everyone feel like they have a place to call their own.





The 2022 NRPA Annual Conference, the largest gathering of park and recreation professionals in the




world, is Sept. 20-22 in Phoenix. This year's conference will feature thought-provoking keynote

#### Amber Klingbeil – Garrison

Amber Klingbeil moved from Mandan to Garrison with her two daughters in 2015 and realized right away the small town just off the north shore of Lake Sakakawea was where she was meant to be.

Two years after arriving in town, a position opened on the Garrison Parks and Recreation Board and

board member Heidi Smith approached Klingbeil to see if she was interested in the vacant position. Klingbeil's first thought was her family, then other families. "I was new to the area at the time and since I have children that are involved in the programs, I thought it was a great way to get involved with the community and meet people," Klingbeil recalled.

"My girls are everything to me and the reason why I joined the park board to begin with," Klingbeil said. "We enjoy using the pool and played ball until they outgrew it. We now spend our free time camping, kayaking, hiking, and enjoying time together around campfires in the summertime. Our winters are filled with movies, board games and anything else we can do together."

That includes making time to enjoy Garrison's parks and recreational facilities.

The park district offers a variety of year-round activities, including swimming, skating, baseball, and softball. Klingbeil is excited about one of the district's newest activities, kickball for 4- and 5-yearold children. "It seems to be a hit that I am looking forward to seeing grow over the years. I enjoy all of the activities that we offer, and how many we are able to offer," Klingbeil added. "My goals are to



make all of the programs that we offer the best that they can be."

The Garrison Park District also offers swimming lessons starting with level 1 and going up to level 7, and many ball programs, including kickball, T-ball, Pee Wee (ages 8-10), Little League (ages 11-12), Babe Ruth (ages 13-15,) and a girls softball



skill building program in the summer months. During the winter, it has an indoor/outdoor skating rink that is generally open from December until March or April, depending on the weather.

Klingbeil explained the park district is not simply maintaining existing facilities and offerings but expanding and upgrading when possible.

"Our board, along with the help of another organization in town, has been working on and just got the approval for a grant to update our pool," Klingbeil said. "The first part of this project will upgrade the pool's pump house. The second part will work on updates needed for the pool house, including making it wheelchair accessible, while finishing up with the possibility of adding a splash pad where our kiddie pool used to be."

Klingbeil said the board also is working on a grant that would help update the softball fields, which are a work in progress.

"I am very proud of this board and all of the small changes that we have made over the years to continue making our facilities and programs the best that they can be," Klingbeil noted. "I am excited to see this pool project move forward and what the possibility of updating our softball fields will bring to the community."

The most challenging part of being a board member is change, she noted. "Whether everyone looks at the change as being good or not, it's still hard," she pointed out. "Not everyone likes change, even though it can be necessary for improvement."

Klingbeil considers NDRPA's *FOCUS* magazine a valuable resource for information. "I enjoy seeing what other areas are doing to improve their communities and parks," she said. our top provider of commercial playgrounds for 50 years

#### **Ground Broken for Fargo Parks Sports Complex**

The Fargo Park District and Fargo Park District Foundation broke ground May 5 on the Fargo Parks Sports Complex. The 260,000-square-foot building will address a critical need for more indoor recreation space, said Dave Leker, executive director of the Fargo Park District.

The facility will provide a community space for a more active and healthier Fargo. More than 13,000 local kids will benefit from the project in its first year of operation. The project includes one full-size indoor soccer turf field, four full-sized basketball courts, administrative offices, multipurpose community space, an indoor

350-meter walking track, and the new home to Sanford Power.

Once completed in 2024, the project will attract more than 600,000 visitors annually. This highly impactful project is a testament to the power of public/private partnership. The project is a collective effort made possible in part by the support of more than 20 community-minded project partners.

Following the official groundbreaking, McGough Construction began construction of the Fargo Parks Sports Complex on 100 acres on the southern edge of Fargo just west of Interstate 29. Construction updates are posted at *FargoParks.com*.



#### **Kramer Retires from Dickinson Parks and Recreation**

Dickinson Parks and Recreation (DPR) Executive Director James Kramer has announced his retirement, effective Aug. 15, 2022. During his career. Kramer was instrumental in the creation of the West River Community Center in 2004 and to the district being named a National Gold Medal Finalist in 2022. He worked to bring many prestigious events, programs and places of recreation to Dickinson, including the 1996 13-Year-Old Babe Ruth World Series. In 2002, Kramer helped get a half-cent sales tax increase passed by public vote to build and fund the West River Community Center that has since been expanded twice. More recently, Kramer participated in planning for the new Dickinson State University Sports Complex slated to open in 2023.

Kramer began his professional career in 1991 as the district's recreation manager. He was director of Williston Parks and Recreation in 1996 before returning to DPR as the business/finance manager in 1997. In 2001, he became the executive director. Kramer has held numerous positions at the local, state and national levels. He served as NDRPA president, on the board of directors, professional development chair, public policy chair, treasurer, and currently serves on the Hall of Fame Council. Kramer also served as a member of Gov. Jack Dalrymple's Task Force for Property Tax Relief and the North Dakota Department of Commerce Task Force for Smart Restart. He currently sits on the

board of directors for the North Dakota Public Health Insurance Trust. At the national level, Kramer served on the American Parks and Recreation Society's board of directors and was a Midwest Regional Council Member for the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA).

Kramer was awarded the NDRPA Outstanding Young Professional Award in 1997, NRPA Presidential Citation of Achievement in 2005, NDRPA Distinguished Professional Award in 2011, and was inducted into the NDRPA Hall of Fame in 2016.

#### **Bismarck Dedicates New Neighborhood Park**



Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) dedicated Bismarck's newest park, A. James Silbernagel Memorial Park, on June 30.

The 4.88-acre neighborhood park was established as part of the City of Bismarck's Neighborhood Park and Open Space Policy, which has provided for parks and open spaces within new developments since 2013.

The park is named in honor of Dr. Arnold James "Jim" Silbernagel, a longtime Bismarck optometrist and farmer/rancher who passed away in 2010. He and his family purchased a farm/ranch in northeast Bismarck in 1971, and much of this land, including the area where the park is located, is now the Silver Ranch subdivision.

Park features include a nature-themed playground, accessible picnic shelter, native pollinator garden, and trail connection to Silver Ranch Greenway Trail.

#### Fargo Park District Bloom Tracker and Selfie Stand in Orchard Park

Orchard Glen Park is a community orchard featuring beautiful blooms in the spring season. This year the Fargo Park District created a bloom tracker on *FargoParks.com* for the public to follow the bloom progress at the orchard.

Photos of the bloom progress were uploaded on *FargoParks.com*. A list of park trees and dates of their expected bloom were also available. Orchard trees include Toka Plum, Patten Pear, Zestar, Trader Mulberry, Snowsweet, Royal Raindrops Crabapple, Kinder Crisp, Flowering Crab, Early Gold Pear, Evans Bali Cherry, Dolgo Crabapple, Compass Cherry Plum, and Autumn Brilliance Serviceberry.

Along with the bloom tracker, the Fargo Park District also installed a four-foot selfie stand that has two 2-foot-by-4-foot panels mounted on each side of the stand. On one side of the panels was a ledge on which park users could set their phone to take a picture. On the other side, a set of five steps were listed letting park users know to share their photos on social media with the Fargo Park District by using #FargoParks.

The selfie stand has been used at different locations throughout the



Fargo Park District's parks. The sign has been transported to multiple park locations that include in front of the Lindenwood Park fountain and at a few different summer event locations, like Island Park.

#### **Beyer Retires from Wahpeton Post After 41 Years**

Longtime Wahpeton Parks and Recreation Director Wayne Beyer retired on May 30, 2022, after 41 years in the position. The NDRPA Hallof-Famer joined Wahpeton Parks and Recreation as recreation director in 1980 and took on the role of parks and recreation director in 1981.

Under Beyer's guidance, the city of Wahpeton added

and expanded many of the programs that residents of Wahpeton and the surrounding area enjoy. He was inducted into the NDRPA Hall of Fame in 2013 and continued to serve the citizens of Wahpeton for another nine years. He was involved with NDRPA for more than three decades and held numerous positions, including president three times, presidentelect, board of directors, secretary, treasurer, FOCUS editor, and membership chair.

Through the years, numerous other organizations

have benefitted from Beyer's leadership and involvement, including the North Dakota Council on the Arts, North Dakota Babe Ruth Baseball, North Dakota Urban and Community Forestry Association, River Keepers, Richland County Historical Society, and Wahpeton Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Beyer earned many awards during his career, including the North Dakota Wildlife Federation North Dakota Sportsman of the Year Award in 2011; the North Dakota Sports Hall of Fame honors for Special Olympics North Dakota in 2009; North Dakota Amateur Softball Association in 1999; North Dakota Game and Fish Department Boat and Water Safety Educator of the Year in 2006; and National Arbor Day Association Sterling Morton Award in 2005.

Beyer received an associate degree from the North Dakota State School of Science in 1976 and a bachelor's degree in physical/health education from Minnesota State University, Moorhead in 1979. He later earned the designation of Certified Parks and Recreation Professional (CPRP) from the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA).





#### **Minot Parks Celebrated Parks and Recreation Month**

The Minot Park District celebrated Parks and Recreation Month in July. # 2021 NDRPA AWARDS HIGHLIGHT

## **Golden Egg Award**

The Golden Egg Award recognizes outstanding and innovative park projects in North Dakota. It was established in honor of former Fargo Park District Superintendent Bob "Goose" Johnson and presented to an agency that manages an innovative park or facility that serves as a model facility or park in its inclusiveness and responsiveness to the needs of the local community or region.

Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) is the 2021 recipient of the Golden Egg Award for



its Cottonwood Park expansion. The project was successful because of the many partners that came together to address the need for additional softball fields in Bismarck.

Softball is big in Bismarck, with the youth and adult programs having the highest participation numbers in the state. Teams were turned away in the men's

and women's leagues due to capacity and scheduling conflicts. Fastpitch teams did not have a "home" of their own for practices and/or games. All programs needed additional fields.

In 2018, community volunteers formed the "Breaking New Ground" committee to expand Cottonwood Park. The Bismarck Men's Slowpitch Softball Association, Bismarck Women's Slowpitch Softball Association and the Bismarck Youth Fastpitch Softball Association were key supporters, along with BPRD.

Ground was broken in April 2019 to add four additional adult softball fields, a four-field youth fastpitch complex with covered dugouts, scoreboards, press box, and grandstand, two lighted fields, a concessions/restroom building, a ticketing booth, additional parking, and green space for warm-up and practice.

Additional amenities include recreational trail connections, two playgrounds, two picnic shelters, natural areas, trees, and shrubs. BPRD also partnered with the Natural Resources Conservation Service to irrigate the park expansion area using river water, thus saving the park district approximately \$200,000 per year in city water fees. This \$4.3 million project was made possible with 119 donors contributing 45% of the total cost.

The 230-acre Cottonwood Complex also is full of other activity and play options. A trail winds through the park and connects with the greater Bismarck trail system. The complex includes an urban fishing pond, a BMX motocross racing track, and the Aaron Haaland



Memorial Baseball Field complete with field lights, a batting cage, press box, ticket booth, and scoreboard.

Soccer is played at Reichert Field, as well as in the large green space at the north end of the park, which can be configured with up to 14 soccer fields. Lacrosse and bocce players also enjoy competing on the green space.

Play on the new softball fields began in 2021, and the complex hosted a number of tournaments, including the Junior Olympics girls' fastpitch state tournament in July 2021. Cottonwood Park also is home to the Bismarck Marathon, which also benefited from the expansion.

## 2021 NDRPA AWARDS HIGHLIGHT

## **Citizen Advocacy Award**

The NDRPA Citizen Advocacy Award recognizes a citizen, elected or appointed official, or volunteer who has demonstrated outstanding contribution to the park, recreation and conservation movement through education and activating the public in their community or state or at the national level. The recipients of the 2021 awards are Dr. Steve Chuppe of Bismarck and Rep. Mike Lefor of Dickinson.



#### **Dr. Steve Chuppe**

Dr. Steve Chuppe opened Chuppe Chiropractic Clinic with his brother in 1988. They eventually expanded services to include physical therapy and renamed the business Chuppe Health.

Chuppe's love of baseball – and all things recreation and

community-oriented – inspired him to co-chair the effort to raise funds for the renovation of Bismarck Municipal Ballpark. For 15 months, Chuppe and cochair, the late Al Bortke, worked with a tenacious group of baseball enthusiasts and Bismarck Parks and Recreation District (BPRD) staff to raise just less than \$1.3 million.

Chuppe's leadership and work with the communityminded team helped create a "new" Bismarck Municipal Ballpark, with a grandstand, stadium seats, ticket booth, press box, concessions, and restrooms. Their efforts have made the entire ballpark experience better for the players, community and visitors. His leadership in beautifying the ballpark and surrounding grounds, including tree plantings and landscaping, will leave a legacy in Bismarck.

In 2017, because of Chuppe's interest in sports, coaching and youth fastpitch, BPRD once again called upon him to work with another set of volunteers and another co-chair, Mike Wolf, to lead a campaign to add eight more softball fields to Cottonwood Park: four fields for adults and a four-field complex for youth fastpitch.

Chuppe enjoys serving his community. He has coached for several organizations, including BPRD and Century High School. He has been a United Way volunteer for more than 20 years and served as president in 2014. He has served on the Bismarck State College Alumni Association board of directors; been involved extensively with Bismarck Baseball Boosters and served as president; and is a member of the ski patrol.

#### **Representative Mike Lefor**

Rep. Mike Lefor has been actively engaged in promoting parks and recreation in the community of Dickinson for more than 35 years. He has experienced numerous facets of parks and recreation, from participating in volleyball, basketball, golf, and softball leagues to officiating these

same leagues – usually taking on the most competitive top leagues.

Lefor always has enjoyed the competitive camaraderie and social aspects that comes with adult recreational programs. He has served on user group committees and volunteers to work special events and tournaments. Lefor served more than 20 years as a Dickinson Park Board commissioner, the last eight as president. He was well known within the park district staff as a commissioner who cared about the employees and tried to always improve the work environment by individually getting to know them.

Lefor's father, Bob, led the charge for the Dickinson Park District to take over ownership of Heart River Golf Course in the 1980s, and Lefor held the same passion for the golf course. He singlehandedly championed efforts to raise more than \$1 million dollars to replace the outdated irrigation system in 2008. Lefor always had the park board focused on improving the quality of life within the community, while letting employees retain ownership and stay focused on day-to-day operations. Lefor was a vital part of the Recreation Building Authority and helped guide the construction and expansion of the West River Community Center and the West River Ice Center.

Although Lefor's passion was parks and recreation, he also was committed to enhancing other community components. He served as the chair of the CHI-St. Alexius Hospital Board, was involved with the Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitors Bureau, and always worked hard to keep Dickinson State University at the forefront of higher education in North Dakota.

Lefor owns Blue 42 Grille and Bar and Green 19 Grill and Lounge and continues to support parks and recreation programs and events with his generosity through donations and sponsorships. He also has served in the North Dakota House of Representatives since 2015. His legislative history has always shown a strong, supportive effort for parks and recreation through his voting record, testimony and engaging with NDRPA during legislative sessions.

Lefor's dedication and support to parks and recreation has had a great impact on the Dickinson community. Congratulations to Rep. Lefor on receiving the award!
